THE FREE KINDNESS OF GOD VERSUS THE EVIL ONE

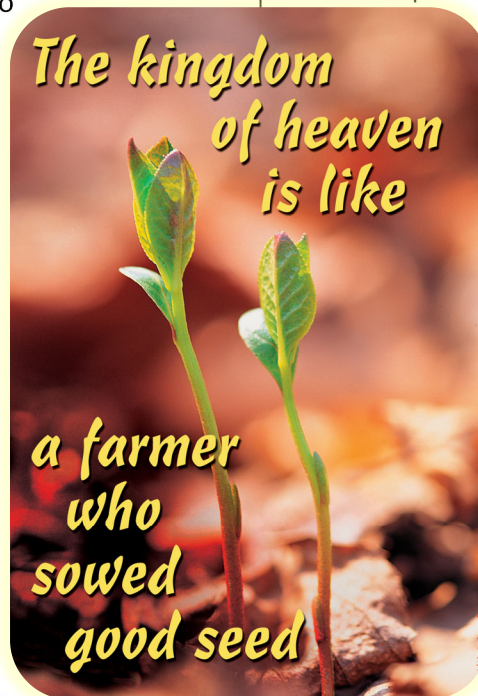

Growing up with my siblings, friends, and neighbors, we would occasionally venture into fields for games or hunting to while away the time and have fun with members of our own age group. On one fateful day of hunting, having been unable to catch anything substantial, one of us spotted a beehive on top of a tree. In our joyful anticipation, we could already taste the sweetness of the honey and no thought was given to the possibility of being stung. Instantly, the boys started throwing pieces of stone to bring down the beehive with the hope of enjoying its honeycombs. Then eventually one person hit it so hard to the point of bringing it down. As could be expected, the bees attacked their invaders ferociously by stinging mercilessly. Many of us got home with swollen faces, especially those that could not run fast. Similarly, when we invest in businesses we expect the best outcome; although, what we get sometimes, is not what we expected.

Jesus Christ uses parables to teach his disciples, aware of the benefit of contextualizing the cultures and values of his audience. Therefore, the background and the characters involved would always be relevant to the people. Jesus portrayed the kingdom of God as a farm, whose owner planted wheat, but an enemy at night planted weeds in the same field. The servants of the farmer inquired, if they could uproot the weeds, to allow the wheat to grow uninterrupted. But the farmer thought uprooting the weeds will adversely affect the wheat and its productivity. Therefore, both the good and the bad should be allowed to grow together until the time of

harvest (judgment) when separation will be made between the good seed of wheat and the bad seed of weeds. The kingdom of God awaits the Judgment Day, for the good and the bad, where and when justice will be meted out, for the good to be rewarded and the bad to be punished eternally.

The example of the mustard seed demonstrates how Jesus Christ, the Word of God (John 1:1), started his mission as an individual with little or no attention from the wider society. However, he prophesied that His message would be spread to the ends of the world; giving shelter, protection, hope, encouragement and purpose to those who accepted his message. The Catholic Church through the centuries has represented the true image of Jesus Christ, and an in-depth meaning of both social and spiritual life. We were once lost, but we can come to the Tree of Life in order to enjoy his guidance, to regain a sense of belonging, and fulfillment in this life and in the next.



The parable of the yeast in the flour, sees yeast not necessarily held in high esteem, but when mixed with flour, it changes the contour and the total outcome of the final product. The yeast makes the bread swell bigger and gives it a unique identity. In the same way, Jesus Christ sees the gospel of the kingdom of God, as disregarded and termed irrelevant or unattractive by men; but when the gospel is embraced —allowed to function in the right perspective, greater things can happen. Jesus Christ remains the answer to bogged down questions, the solution to all problems, the hope to our hopelessness, and the rest to our anxious minds.

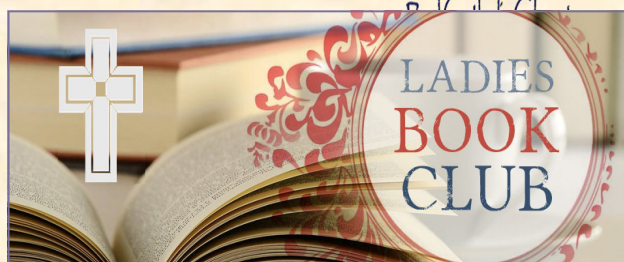

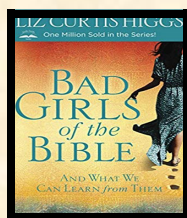

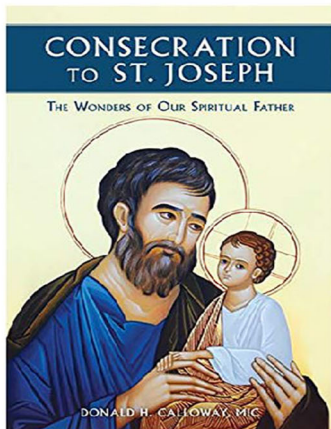

SAINT SHARBEL MAKHLŪF (1828-1898) July 24

The convenience store owner chatted animatedly in Arabic with coworkers, but hardly at all with his American clientele. So soon after 9/11, he probably figured, with my accent, the less said, the better. That changed when an American customer recognized Saint Sharbel's portrait on the wall: "So you're Lebanese Maronites!" The owner was happily incredulous: "You know our saint?" "Not at first," the customer admitted. "But we help the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, and their magazine published that picture and called Sharbel the 'Paradoxical Artisan of Peace.'" "Everyone thinks we're Muslims," said the owner, "and some of my workers are. Saint Sharbel helps us live together in peace!" A hermit for twenty-three years, little is known of Sharbel's life. He died after suffering a stroke while celebrating the liturgy. Miracles attributed to his intercession number in the thousands, and in war-torn Lebanon, Catholics, Orthodox, and Muslims pray together where his incorrupt body is entombed. How lovely if after our passing, we too could be remembered for having brought very different people to the one God, together in peace.

Hope Remains: A Journey to Africa By Dr. Sue Moravec

(Part 5) It is February 10th and no rest for the weary. Today Fr. Henry Atuma (Vicar for Bishop George) is coming to drive us to the village. It is a long drive on a “road” filled with so many holes, that it would be considered “off road-ing” by American standards. Also, it was risky, several times there was a security check, so I would smile at the AK gun-holding men. Each time they would ask for a “donation” or some sort of “gift.” Fortunately, Fr. Henry knew what to say to them and they would let us pass. It is here I got my first chance to experience the Nigerian village life where Fr. Victor, Fr. Julius, Fr. Henry, and Fr. Bitrus all grew up. This tiny village has produced 8 priests and it was Bishop George’s first assignment as a young priest. All these priests are within 5 years of age, so their families grew up together, making their priesthood bond more meaningful. As we parked and walked into the village, everyone came out of their single room homes to see what was happening. Suddenly, I looked back, and I had a huge following



of incredibly young children, about 3 to 6-year-olds with little clothes, no shoes. They had never seen a white person. They were giggling and trying so hard to maneuver to get a good look at me. When I would make eye contact, they would dance and laugh. Fr. Victor would ask the children to step back, but they were going to follow me no matter what. As we entered Fr. Victor’s home, his parents were there to greet us. Can you see where Father Victor gets his looks? There is no running water, and electricity is a generator that is only run now and then. There is no stove or

refrigerators. In the yard is a cow, chickens, and farm life. At this time, the fields were dry. Water is hauled into the house every day. Now, if you have been a St. Paul parishioner for awhile, you might remember that our youth group raised money to build a well. Do you remember? You can imagine my shock when Father showed me where the well was built. The old well had dried up and the government refused to build a new source of water for his village. As mentioned, the government does not support Christian towns. St. Paul parishioners, if you donated to the Build-a-Well Youth Group Fundraiser, God Bless you! The people are surviving on your well. Important to note, I was able to see how all your support to the Diocese of Zaria was utilized, especially for seminarians. I asked God to guide me on how I could help these people when I returned. For now, my support will be heartfelt loving prayers since upon my return, coronavirus stopped any plans.

Time was running short, and we had to be off the village roads before dark for the safety of the priests. I visited Fr. Julius and Fr. Henry’s home where his mother and brother were extremely sick, recovering from malaria. We prayed over them and sadly, Fr. Henry’s mom died about a month later. Finally, we went to the village parish church where these priests attended as kids. Their Pastor was a strict Irish missionary and it was hilarious hearing stories about what happened if they misbehaved. We met the two priests who are currently serving there. Did you know that Fr. Ishaya also served there? We made it back safely to Kaduna, only to watch the news about coronavirus reaching Europe. Our flight back was through Europe, would that effect our trip home in two weeks? The Nigerian government had begun to test airline passengers from Italy and news shows reported airline delays and cancelations. Were we going to be stuck in Nigeria?
