

Checks were delivered!

On August 10th our Council delivered checks to the last two of our seven charities. The Nazareth House Seminary received checks for \$1,000.00 from the Knights of Columbus and another for \$500.00 from our St. Paul's Women's Guild. We also met with Father Paul Sullivan and Father Kurt Perera and set a date for our Seminarian dinner. We normally serve dinner to approximately thirty seminarians at the end of their retreat at Mt. Claret. This year the date conflicted with the date of the installation of our new Bishop John

Dolan. The new date for the dinner will be on September 29th and will be held at the Nazareth House in central Phoenix.

The second stop was to the Grand Canyon University Newman Center. A check for \$500.00 was presented, and we were given a royal tour of the Center by two Sisters of the Order of Servants of the Pierced Hearts of Jesus and Mary. We learned all about the activities they offer to students during the academic year. The Center is run by the two nuns and our own Council's Father David Loeffler with the help of student volunteers from the university.

The Center is truly the epitome of evangelization. There is a Chapel that seats about one hundred worshipers. They celebrate daily Mass and it also serves as an Adoration Chapel. On occasion they have accommodated up to 190 worshipers by moving the Chapel to the parking lot. To many of the students the Center is a home away from home. In addition to their activities at the Center the two nuns and Father David go on campus to meet with student groups. A popular activity on campus is for the sisters and students to sit in a circle on the lawn and pray the rosary while onlookers watch from the surrounding buildings.

We have several functions coming up soon. These will be Parish wide functions led by the Knights of Columbus. On October 16th we have Arizona Rosary Celebration. October 30th is St. Paul's Parish Festival (Picnic). We will need all hands on deck! God Bless Us All.




BINGO TO BENEFIT EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT

The entire project will become a prominent display on our parish campus and is to be completed this Fall with a total cost of around \$2,000 of which the statue is a major part. Eric will be seeking funds from other sources to complete the project.

August 13 is the date of Knights of Columbus founder Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney's feast day and Council 15001 has adopted a policy of reserving a Mass on that date each year to honor him. COUNCIL LEADERSHIP PRESENTS CHECKS ON AUG. 10

Your Council leadership team of Grand Knight Francis Abijaoude, Imm. Past GK/Trustee Kirk LaPlante and PGK/Financial Secretary Jack Swartz had the privilege of presenting 2 checks to religious entities from the funds raised by our state raffle.

<u>First:</u> The 3 Officers met at the diocesan seminary, Nazareth House, with Fr. Kurt Perera, current director of the seminary, and Fr. Paul Sullivan, former director and current rector, to present \$1,500 (\$500 of it came from St. Paul's Women's Guild's shredding project).

<u>Second</u>: This was followed by a visit to the Grand Canyon University Newman Center and a meeting with Fr. David Loeffler, a long time member of Council 15001 (even before he became a priest), as well as 2 young nuns who help with so many of the activities of the Center. A \$500 check was presented there. Fr. David was invited by the team to speak at our Soup & Bread Supper during Lent and he tentatively agreed.

Our Lady Help of Persecuted Christians

A question was raised whether anyone knew anything about Our Lady Help of Persecuted Christians. Supreme created large icons for the 2019-2020 Fraternal Year. Each State received at least one icon. States with larger memberships received two and sometimes three icons. The icons were supposed to move to Councils throughout the States for prayer services. At the end of the Fraternal Year the State Councils kept the icon(s)

Supreme provided. There should still be at least one icon in the State's possession, although some States would donate the icon to an appropriate parish.

On the next page is shown is a picture of the icon with an annotation describing the icon's details.

The Knights were largely responsible for getting the U.S. to declare that persecution of Christians by ISIS was genocide.

As to the calendar, I would urge Officers to include Holy Days and some Solemnities with the thought of doing something special to enhance the day.

For example, August 15, the Solemnity of the Assumption. It is not a holy day this year; but it is usually a holy day.

However, it remains a Solemnity and the calendar had a scheduled meeting on the 15th.

November 2 is The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed and we have a meeting on this date.

March 25 is the Solemnity of the Annunciation. The Knights have proclaimed this day as the day of unborn because the

Word became flesh within Mary on this day. The Knights have a prayer program for this Solemnity.

There are other dates as well: March 19th, St. Joseph the Husband of Mary; May 1, the feast of St. Joseph the Worker and the fourth Sunday of July; World Day for grandparents and the Elderly. A plenary indulgence is granted for people who visit with the elderly and fulfill the other usual requirements for a plenary indulgence.

Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Although the precise date is unknown, the Assumption is the oldest feast of our Lady. On a hill near the Tomb of Mary, the place of dormition, of falling asleep, early Christian's celebrated the Memory of Mary later changed to the Assumption which spread throughout the Church.

It was only in 1950, in the Apostolic Constitution Munificentissimus *Deus*, that Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption of Mary a dogma of the Catholic Church in these words: "The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven."

Normally August 15 is a holy day of obligation. Because it fell on Monday this year, the obligation was lifted, but it remains a Solemnity.

There are many opportunities in the liturgical calendar to enrich, educate, and affirm our faith. The Knights have picked some special dates to provide programmatic material.

The Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord. The Knights proclaim this as a feast of the unborn, because Christ – the Word – truly became flesh in Mary's womb. This Solemnity is usually celebrated on March 25, nine months before Christmas.

Beginning in 2004, the Knights of Columbus dedicated September 11 as the World Day of Prayer for Peace. Pope Francis has declared the fourth Sunday is July as World Day of Grandparents and the Elderly offering a plenary indulgence for those who spend time with the elderly and meet the usual conditions for a plenary indulgence.

Icon Program

Since 1979 Supreme has commissioned icons as a centerpiece of "rosary based" prayer service. The first icon was Our Lady of Guadalupe. Others included Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Our Lady of Częstochowa, Our Lady of Pochaiv, Our Lady of the Rosary, Our Lady of Charity, Our Lady Help of Persecuted Christians, and the Holy Family.

With his installation as Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly consecrated his administration to St. Joseph. The first icon under his administration is St. Joseph holding the Child Jesus taken from the St. Joseph Oratory in Montreal and inspired by Pope Francis' Apostolic letter, Patris Corde.

Icons are distributed to every State Council. The State Councils rotate the icon among Councils which conduct a prayer service with the icon displayed. After circulating the icon, State Councils get to keep them.

The ICON of Our Lady of Persecuted Christians is the 18th in the series to circulate during the 2019-2020 fraternal year. Under Mary's cape are many images of persecuted Christians, both known individuals and representatives of groups. The picture with annotations is attached. 





The calculator will then ask several more questions and then provide you with the information you wish to review. If you already have an adequate portfolio, then you may see a congratulatory notice that you have everything in place. However, most of us will find that we may need a little more help to achieve the goals many of us have set for ourselves.
