



Promoting the Domestic Church— Families

The Knights of Columbus Order has always been interested in the development of strong and vibrant families. To support this philosophy and to create an awareness of many of our parish families, our Knights of Columbus Supreme Council, located in New Haven, Connecticut started the "Family of the Month" program in 1978. The "Family of the Month" program has become a successful part of our "Faith in Action" program.

Family of the Month

The Knights of Columbus "Family of the Month" Program promotes and recognizes families who outwardly exhibit strong ties of love and faith, demonstrating Catholic family values, and how the family makes meaningful contributions to our parish and the community.

Our Council has established a "Family of the Month" committee whose responsibility it will be to select a "Family of the Month". The committee is made up of our St. Paul's Knights of Columbus Council members and the St. Paul's parish staff. We are working together to get recommendations for selecting a "Family of the Month". Our "Family of the Month" committee is not looking for "Super Families", but we are looking for families who live traditional Catholic family values like:



- •Is the family tight knit? Does the family spend quality time together?
- •Does the family attend weekly Mass together? Does the family pray together outside of Mass?
- Has the family made significant contributions to the parish and church community?
- •Does the family serve as a model of Catholic family values?

On the 15th day of each 12 month period — from August through July — the "Family of the Month" submissions will be drawn at random from entries received at our Supreme Council offices in New Haven, Connecticut. Then, each of the selected families will receive a special Holy Family gift, and a personal letter of congratulations from our Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly. These items will be mailed directly to the family's home address.

Family of the Year

Our "Family of the Month" Committee is also participating in selecting a "Family of the Year". The "Family of the Year" selection process is the same as the "Family of the Month". An eligible Family of the Year" recipient must be a Knights of Columbus family that has been selected in the last 12 months. Our committee will consider whether the family has continued to show the traits of a strong Catholic family as well as promoting the principles of our Church as well as the principles of the Order of the Knights of Columbus.

The Knights of Columbus Supreme Council will make a "Family of the Year" selection received from all of the Knights of Columbus State Councils. The "Family of the Year" will be invited to attend the annual Knights of Columbus Supreme Convention where a special presentation will be made.

Vitalant Awards Luncheon For Blood Drive

For explanation of the Vitalant Blood Drive program we refer to the 2022 Vitalant Awards Luncheon, "The Impact" award is the most prestigious and difficult award to earn, signifying outstanding leadership in blood drive coordination. As an aside, I've said time and again it's the parish's award. I just go to pick it up. Council Brothers Andre Cerna, Ted Cherekos and Jerry Surdakowski preceded Tom VanBuren and me in making the K of C Council 15001's project the success it has become.

After attending the Vitalant Valentines for Life Awards Lunch for the first time last year, I wanted to share the "festivities" with others. Unfortunately, other commitments came into play. However, I was quite happy Fr. Bruno had accepted my invitation. Richard "Dief" Diefendorf was the 2nd Worthy Grand Knight during my tenure as a Co-coordinator of the St. Paul's Blood Drives.

History: The blood drives at St. Paul's Catholic Parish were initiated by a family named Weaver who had a child with some illness, not sure but it could have been leukemia, and several blood transfusions were necessary to enable the youngster's recovery. As time went on, Mr. Weaver passed away; the family moved away from the Parish, but United Blood Services still expected some blood drives at the parish. The Knights of Columbus Council 15001 took upon themselves putting the blood drives together. Somewhere between 2016 and 2019 United Blood Services was acquired by Vitalant. Brother Andre Cerna was the first front line coordinator I knew at St. Paul's. When I became a member of Council 15001, Andre Cerna resigned and Jerry Surdakowski was a co-captain. At my first meeting at St. Paul's Council Jerry was looking for help. I'd put together blood drives at St. Luke's and also in Rock Springs, Wyoming. All for United Blood Services. When Jerry was in New York during the summers of 2019 and 2020 I did all the setting up of the tables, equipment and set-up myself.

GK Francis and Brother Knights, I'm here to tell you. . . The concern that was raised during the pandemic shutdown of our parishioners' inability to donate blood amazed me. The March 2020 drive was cancelled because the shut down/quarantine was enacted five days before the blood drive. People were asking if it's cool enough to have the drive on the lawn where the Stations of The Cross are held. Vitalant couldn't use their blood mobiles units because there was no way to drive the long distances. However, that was the first suggestion. The St. Paul's donor roster numbers close to 300. Except for this past blood drive, we invariably get three to five donors from the neighborhood who see the blood drive notice on the electronic billboard.

The goal of the March 2023 blood drive was 35 donations. There were 55 appointment slots initially provided by Vitalant. Two Sundays before the March 26th drive, 52 people made appointments to donate blood on the 26th. Four parishioners had made appointments to give blood at one of the Vitalant Donation locations or another blood drive scheduled prior to ours. I notified our Donor Coordinator at Vitalant of the high number of appointments so as to add one Donation Staff.

The results of OUR FIRST DRIVE of 2023, "The results are in and you had 52 donors go through interview resulting in 47 successful donations of which 6 donated a power red*. With these results you have reached 121% of donor goal and 123% of product goal and will help save as many as 135 people in our community hospitals."

What Is Power Red*

*To donate power red, people must:

- not be ill
- if male, be at least 17 years old, be a minimum of 5 feet 1 inch tall, and weigh at least 130 lb.
- if female, be at least 19 years old, be a minimum of 5 feet 5 inches tall, and weigh at least 150 lb.



Have you ever seen the Nazarene Symbol?



You might have seen the Arabic letter \circ popping up on friends' Facebook and Twitter profile pics and have been wondering what it means. Long before the Arabic letter for "N" was spray painted on all Christian property to be seized by ISIS militants in Mosul, Iraq, the "N" has stood for the Arabic word for Christian, which is "Nasrani" or Nazarene and always referred to Jesus the Nazarene, our Savior. These Mosul Christians were given an ultimatum to either convert to Islam, submit to their radical rule and pay a religious levy, or face death by the sword. Many fled for their lives.

The symbol used by ISIS to identify Christians to be persecuted is now being used by Christians all over the world on Facebook and Twitter as an act of solidarity with our brothers and sisters being persecuted and martyred.

We should encourage Christians to use this symbol NOT as an act of hate or vengeance against any of our Muslim brothers and sisters, and NOT as a way of associating all Muslims as terrorists or like ISIS.

We should encourage Christians to use this symbol as a reminder to PRAY for all persecuted Christians in the Middle East. Use this symbol as a reminder to PRAY for the non-Christians who are being persecuted in the Middle East, some of whom are moderate Muslims. (Note that the $\dot{\upsilon}$ symbol first showed up as a sign of solidarity in a rally held at a Christian church in east Baghdad. A rally that reports say had *200 Muslims* in attendance showing an act of solidarity with the persecuted Christians.)

Most importantly, use this symbol to show that you too are a Christian, a follower of Jesus the Nazarene, and like our brothers and sisters in Iraq being killed for their faith, you should believe nothing in the world is more valuable than faith in <u>Jesus' mercy</u> and unquenchable love, not even life itself.
