The Word of God, Catechesis in Three Parts

The Key Word

What, then, must we do to properly receive the Word of God proclaimed at Mass? The *General Instruction* tells us that "the readings from the Word of God are to be listened to reverently by everyone" (no. 29), and provides that those who read the Scriptures at Mass must be "truly suited to carrying out this function and carefully prepared, so that by their hearing the readings from the sacred texts the faithful may conceive in their hearts a sweet and living affection for Sacred Scripture" (no. 101).

The key word in all of this is *listening*. We are called to *listen* attentively as the reader, deacon or priest proclaims God's Word. Unless one is unable to hear, one should not be reading along with a text from a missal or missalette. Rather, taking our cue from the *General Instruction* itself, we should *listen* as we would if Christ himself were standing at the ambo, for in fact it *is* God who speaks when the Scriptures are proclaimed. Carefully following along with the printed word can cause us to miss the gentle voice of the Holy Spirit, the message that the Spirit may have for us in one of the passages because we are anxious to "keep up," to move along with the reader.

Perhaps the best way to understand the readings at Mass and our response to them is offered by Saint John Paul II in his Instruction *Dies Domini*. He encourages "those who take part in the Eucharist—priest, ministers and faithful . . . to prepare the Sunday liturgy, reflecting beforehand upon the word of God which will be proclaimed" and adds that if we do not, "it is difficult for the liturgical proclamation of the word of God alone to produce the fruit we might expect" (no. 40). In this way we will till the soil, preparing our souls to receive the seeds to be planted by the Word of God so that seed may bear fruit.

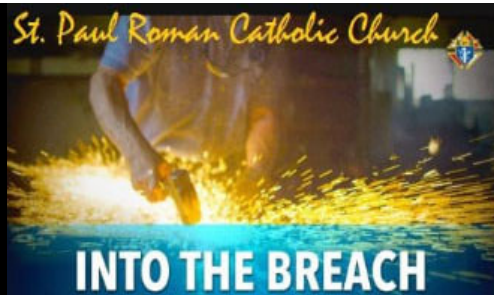
The Word of God, then, calls for our listening and our response in silent reflection, as well as in word and song. Most important of all, the Word of God, which is living and active, calls each of us individually and all of us together for a response that moves beyond the liturgy itself and affects our daily lives, leading us to engage fully in the task of making Christ known to the world by all that we do and say in our life. Please, keep connected by reading the Bible. May God's Word enrich you.

Going to Communion without Confession (Part 1)

Here at St. Paul, we have diligent in offering several devotions to the Holy Eucharist. First Friday Exposition, Benediction, Adoration, Holy Thursday Exposition, Adoration, reopening of our Adoration Chapel, and the parish procession of the Blessing Sacrament on Corpus Christi. Note: we are planning on repeating procession of the Blessed Sacrament on Christ the King (November 25th). This was so successful in showing everyone in our neighborhood our devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. In addition, I've written articles about the highest form of prayer, the Holy Sacrifice of Mass. This act of worship is truly difficult for our simple minds to comprehend the privilege of witnessing Our Lord's presence in the Holy Eucharist. And reminder that Mary, our Virgin Mother (and all the angels and saints) are present during the consecration. Furthermore, St. Bernard wrote that they are all kneeled at OUR feet when the sacred Eucharist is consumed.

Such reverence and participation in the Holy Mass is so important. We receive so many blessings at Mass. Among these blessings is the penitential rite at the beginning of Mass. The priest pauses and he invites us to call to mind our sins. Lord have Mercy, Christ have Mercy, Lord have Mercy! We must acknowledge our sins in order to celebrate Mass. "Through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault." Then priest says the words, "May Almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to eternal life." Note this formula is not a sacramental absolution (as in confession) but a petition for remission to worthily celebrate the mysteries of the Mass. *"The faithful recall their sins and place their trust in God's abiding mercy. The Act of Penitence includes Kyrie Eleison, a Greek phrase meaning, "Lord, have mercy." This litany recalls God's merciful actions throughout history."* (USCCB).

Does this replace the Sacrament of Confession? NO!!! This part of Mass is for venial sins, not for mortal sins. What is venial sin? *Venial sin weakens charity; it manifests a disordered affection for created goods; it impedes the soul's progress in the exercise of the virtues and the practice of the moral good; it merits temporal punishment. Deliberate and unrepented venial sin disposes us little by little to commit mortal sin. However venial sin does not set us in direct opposition to the will and friendship of God; it does not break the covenant with God. With God's grace it is humanly reparable. "Venial sin does not deprive the sinner of sanctifying grace, friendship with God, charity, and consequently eternal happiness."* (CCC 1863)

Venial sins are less than a mortal sin, but could easily elevate to mortal sin, depending on the seriousness of your heart. For example, you got mad at your neighbor, but it quickly turns to mortal sin if you have deliberate hatred towards him/her. The Catechism explains (CCC 2303), *"Hatred of the neighbor is mortal sin when one deliberately wishes him evil. Hatred of the neighbor is a grave sin when one deliberately desires him grave harm."* Another example is using abusive language. If directed to a person (grave) or maybe you slipped out a "bad word" when you stubbed your toe (venial).

Defining sins and the types can be confusing. But just remember, it is where your heart lies. God knows your heart and intentions. Ask yourself, what was my intent?

The next article (part II) we will compare to Mortal Sin. Why? Because it is a DIRECT offence to Jesus to receive Him in the Holy Eucharist when you have mortal sin(s) that you have not confessed. We will review mortal sin on next article. The lesson here is we don't just receive Holy Communion as a routine or as a "right". Mary, Our Lady of the Holy Eucharist, pray for us!

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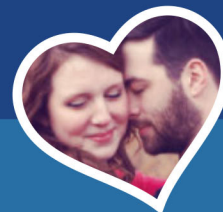
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
