The Feast of the Assumption is celebrated on August 15th and the Eastern Orthodox and Eastern Catholics celebrate the Dormition of the Mother of God (or Dormition of the Theotokos, the falling asleep of the Mother of God) on the same date, and is preceded by a 14 day fast period.

Eastern Christians believe that Mary died a natural death, that her soul was received by Christ upon death, that her body was resurrected after her death and that she was taken up into heaven bodily in anticipation of the general resurrection.

Orthodox tradition is clear and unwavering in regard to the central point [of the Dormition]: the Holy Virgin underwent, as did her Son, a physical death, but her body – like His – was afterwards raised from the dead and she was taken up into heaven, in her body as well as in her soul.

She has passed beyond death and judgement and lives wholly in the Age to Come. The Resurrection of the Body ... has in her case been anticipated and is already an accomplished fact.

That does not mean, however, that she is dissociated from the rest of humanity and placed in a wholly different category: for we all hope to share one day in that same glory of the Resurrection of the Body that she enjoys even now.¹

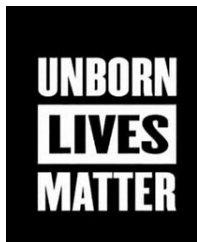

On Sunday July 23rd, Council 15001 held the 2nd of three blood drives at St. Paul's church in Phoenix. Once again, they facilitated the mid-summer drive.

Parishioners and K of C and family members as well as people from the neighborhood - 38 in total - left their air conditioned homes and gathered at their scheduled time to donate. There were twenty seven successful donations made.

The summer blood drive has never been one of our best drives. Many donors leave Phoenix in June not to be seen again until mid-September or later. With a seven day 110 degrees plus heat wave, people have been going to the west coast or to Northern Arizona to escape the heat.

The "Pledge" program I have spoken about, since the Covid quarantine, has ended and leaped forward during this blood drive. Vitalant has made up a QR Code unique to St. Paul's Catholic Parish in Phoenix, Arizona. The Blood Drive Team started handing them out on July 1st. When ever the Vitalant Donor donates Whole Blood, Power Red, Platelets or Plasma at ANY Vitalant Blood Drive or Donation Center, that donor should scan the QR Code with their Smartphone, fill out the requested information and St. Paul's will be credited with the donation.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel or Virgin of Carmel, is the title given to the Blessed Virgin Mary in her role as patroness of the Carmelite Order, which is particularly done within the Catholic Church. The first Carmelites were Christian hermits living on Mount Carmel in the Holy Land during the late 12th and early to mid—13th century. They built in the hermitages a chapel which they dedicated to the Blessed Virgin, whom they conceived of in chivalric terms as the "Lady of the Place." Our Lady of Mount Carmel was adopted in the 19th century as the patron saint of Chile.

Since the 15th century, popular devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel has centered on the Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, also known as the Brown Scapular. Traditionally, Mary is said to have given the Scapular to an early Carmelite named Simon Stock (1165–265). The liturgical feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel is celebrated on July 16th.

St. John Paul the Great referred to this new culture as the "culture of death".

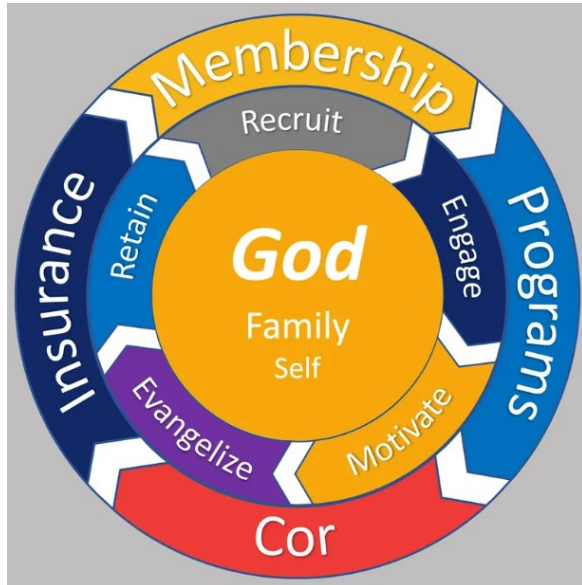
We need to build the New culture.

Meaning of the Knight's Emblem

The Knights of Columbus Emblem



The Columbian coat of arms consists solely of straight lines and angles, symbolizing the determination, tenacity, firmness and courage that the Order's founders had to overcome in their effort to face cultural difficulties and to defend their faith and while operating in a difficult historical and political period.

Figures and Symbols

The Columbian Coat of Arms contains three symbolic elements: the sword, the anchor and the battle axe, recalling the noble and illustrious deeds of the Order's founders.

The sword and the anchor, placed one over the other, form a sort of "X" or St Andrew's cross.

The sword symbolizes honor, distinction, bravery and courage.

The anchor, an instrument designed to hold a ship in place, represents that which attaches, stops, consolidates and stabilizes.

The battle axe, placed on the shield, symbolizes action taken to overcome obstacles or ambushes on the road to accomplishing one's objectives.

The bundle represents the solid grouping of people come together to realize a common ideal under the guidance of a recognized leader. It symbolizes teamwork, the strength inherent in unity and fraternity.

The Colors

The blue (azure), represents the sky, that is, God who watches over the world. It is the symbol of hope, peace, and confidence.

The white (silver) is innocence, frankness and purity of intention.

The yellow (gold) denotes indestructible goods, the richness that comes with hard work.

The red symbolizes giving of one's self, courage, valor and heroism in the fight for one's faith, one's language and one's rights.

The Fourth Degree Emblem



The Fourth Degree emblem is made up of three distinct symbols which represent the three persons of the Holy Trinity.

Figures and Symbols

The cross represents God the Son, redeemer of all men.

The globe represents God the Father, creator of the universe and all things visible and invisible.

The Helmet placed on the upper part of the Coat of Arms The Dove represents God the Holy represents rank or degree of nobility. On the coat of arms Spirit, sanctifier of the world, breath of a warrior it is the noblest and principal ornament. life and inspiration for all men.

The little white triangle, above the helmet and pointing These three symbols remind the upward, symbolizes the flame which lights and guides. Knights that they have the faith and belief in the Trinity.

Colors

Blue (azure) symbolic of innocence.

White (silver) is the symbol of integrity.

Yellow (gold) is intended as the symbol for the riches acquired through hard work.

Red stands for courage, valor and giving of one's self.

The colors emphasize the basic principle of the Fourth Degree: PATRIOTISM.

Promoting the Domestic Church— Families

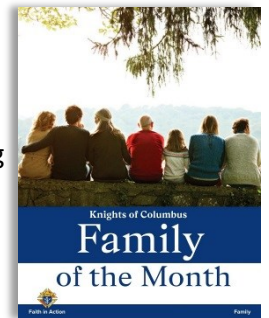
The Knights of Columbus Order has always been interested in the development of strong and vibrant families. To support this philosophy and to create an awareness of many of our parish families, our Knights of Columbus Supreme Council, located in New Haven, Connecticut started the “Family of the Month” program in 1978. The “Family of the Month” program has become a successful part of our “Faith in Action” program.

Family of the Month

The Knights of Columbus “Family of the Month” Program promotes and recognizes families who outwardly exhibit strong ties of love and faith, demonstrating Catholic family values, and how the family makes meaningful contributions to our parish and the community.

Our Council has established a “Family of the Month” committee whose responsibility it will be to select a “Family of the Month”. The committee is made up of our St. Paul’s Knights of Columbus Council members and the St. Paul’s parish staff. We are working together to get recommendations for selecting a “Family of the Month”. Our “Family of the Month” committee is not looking for “Super Families”, but we are looking for families who live traditional Catholic family values like:

- Is the family tight knit? Does the family spend quality time together?
- Does the family attend weekly Mass together? Does the family pray together outside of Mass?
- Has the family made significant contributions to the parish and church community?
- Does the family serve as a model of Catholic family values?



On the 15th day of each month — from August through July — the “Family of the Month” submissions will be drawn at random from entries received at our Supreme Council offices in New Haven, Connecticut. Each of the selected families will receive a special Holy Family gift, and a personal letter of congratulations from our Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly. These items will be mailed directly to the family’s home address.

Our “Family of the Month” Committee is also participating in selecting a “Family of the Year”. The “Family of the Year” selection process is the same as the “Family of the Month”. An eligible “Family of the Year” recipient must be a Knights of Columbus family that has been selected in the last 12 months. Our committee will consider whether the family has continued to show the traits of a strong Catholic family as well as promoting the principles of our Church and the principles of the Order of the Knights of Columbus.

The Knights of Columbus Supreme Council will make a “Family of the Year” selection received from all of the Knights of Columbus State Councils. The “Family of the Year” will be invited to attend the annual Knights of Columbus Supreme Convention where a special presentation will be made.

The next two scheduled 4th Degree ceremonies are being set for Tucson in September, and November in Phoenix. The Phoenix 4th Degree ceremony is scheduled for November 4, 2023 at Our Lady of Joy in Carefree. Each ‘Degree’ of the Knights of Columbus is associated with a particular virtue— Charity, Unity, and Fraternity. The Fourth Degree being “Patriotism or as it commonly known known as ‘The Patriotic Degree’.

What is the Patriotic Degree?

The Fourth Degree was established in New York on 22 February, 1900. The requirements for joining the 4th are that a brother Knight must be a third degree member in good standing, be an exemplary Catholic, and be of sound citizenship of his country.

The Fourth Degree is frequently regarded as an honorary title but should rather be thought of in terms of service to church and country, and the goals of the Fourth Degree may be summarized as the promotion of the ideals of Catholicism and Patriotism side by side.

The Goals of the Fourth Degree

The goals of the Fourth Degree Are:

- To promote and strengthen the patriotic spirit of the civic community.
- To educate its members, and others, both in the teachings of Holy Mother Church, and the history of our nation.
- To promote by example the highest type of citizenship so necessary for the preservation and perpetuation of republican form of government, and its democratic institutions.
- To oppose dissemination and spread of doctrine dangerous to our form of government, and to the Divine law of faith and morality.
- To support by word and deed, the duly constituted authorities of local, state and national government and to recognize excellence in public life.

It is not unusual to find Fourth Degree Knights participating visibly in church events, such as Eucharistic processions and others, in the community, standing up for the unborn and the elderly at Pro-Life events and commemorating the sacrifices of previous generations.

The primary purpose of the Fourth Degree is to foster the spirit of patriotism by promoting responsible citizenship and a love of and loyalty to the Knights' respective countries through active membership in local Fourth Degree groups called Assemblies.

At this time, when our way of life is being challenged both locally and globally, we ask that all men rise up to answer the call of becoming a Fourth Degree member to show that we will publicly defend both our rights and religious responsibilities
