Why Doesn't God Heal Everybody?

We all struggle with this question throughout our lives, and especially when we lose someone who is close to us. On June 21st, I lost a dear friend of 40+ years to a 5+ month battle with brain cancer. I prayed for a miracle healing, which did not come in his case. He will be missed by all those who loved him.



Today Fr. Mike Schmitz challenges us to think about and pray about how we view healing and suffering. As Knights of Columbus members of St. Paul's Council 15001, we need to take 11.5 minutes out of our busy days and listen to this video by Fr Mike—which provides an important perspective on this important question. I have included some quotes from the video below so you can get a glimpse into his message. Please watch the video to get the whole story and then share it with your loved ones!!!

“Jesus is a miracle worker. He worked many incredible “signs and wonders” during His 33 years on earth and He continues to stun us with modern miracles to this day. He has healed us physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually. But if He has shown us that He can do this... why hasn't He healed everyone?”

From *The Catechism of the Catholic Church*, the section on Illness in human life (paragraphs 1500, 1501):

- ♦ Illness and suffering have always been among the gravest problems confronted in human life. In illness, man experiences his powerlessness, his limitations and his finitude. Every illness can make us glimpse death.
- ♦ Illness can lead to anguish, self-absorption, sometimes even despair and revolt against God. It can also make a person more mature, helping him discern in his life what is not essential so that he can turn toward that which is. Very often illness provokes a search for God and a return to Him.

“God heals for two reasons:

- 1) He Loves YOU;
- 2) He uses signs to point to Himself.”

"There are times when Jesus heals, and there are times when Jesus doesn't heal. Both times He is still Lord, in both times He is still God, in both times He is still good, and in both times He still Loves YOU. If you find yourself in that place right now, know this - He is still Lord, He is still good, He is still God and He still Loves YOU. He is always doing something in this! ... That is what you are called to in this moment - to cling to Jesus, even if that also means to cling to Jesus on the Cross.”

In Memoriam

Charles “Chuck” Kime, PhD
December 28, 1929—June 5, 2023



On June 16th our Council learned of the passing one of our Brother Knights, Charles Kime, who joined our Council in 2018.

His funeral was at St Paul’s Parish on June 23, 2023. He is survived by his wife Judy and two sons. A rosary service was given and a letter of condolence was given to the family by our Grand Knight Francis Abijaoude during his funeral service.

Charles H. Kime, PhD was an Assistant Professor at Arizona State University East Campus. He coordinated the Fire Services Programs in the College of Technology and Applied Sciences, which included a Bachelor of Applied Science degree in Fire Service Management and a Master of Science in Technology degree in Fire Service Administration. Prior to joining Arizona State University, Dr. Kime spent more than 32 years serving with the Phoenix, Arizona Fire Department, retiring in 1999 as the Executive Assistant Fire Chief. In the fire services, his experiences ranged from line firefighting positions to supervisory and middle management, then to executive management positions which spanned more than twenty years. During his fire services career, Dr. Kime was very active in university education. He taught in the graduate program of the Arizona State University School of Public Affairs as well as the Bachelor of Interdisciplinary Studies degree program at the same institution, in addition to his teaching of myriad fire sciences and fire services administration classes. His research interests included organizational leadership, organizational behavior and human resource management—especially within the context of the fire service. Dr. Kime held a Bachelors Degree in Industrial Technical Education, a Master of Business Administration degree and a Doctorate in public administration. His book, *Organizational leadership: Fire services in the United States*, was published in 2001 by Elsevier.

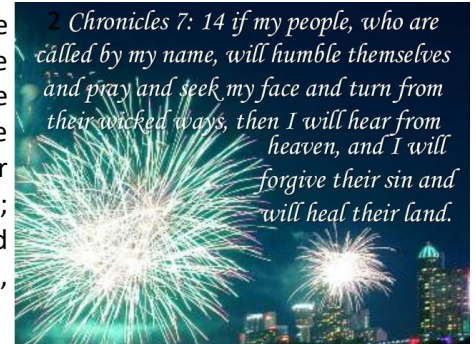
LCWC center is staffed by licensed medical personnel, trained counselors and experienced administrative staff.

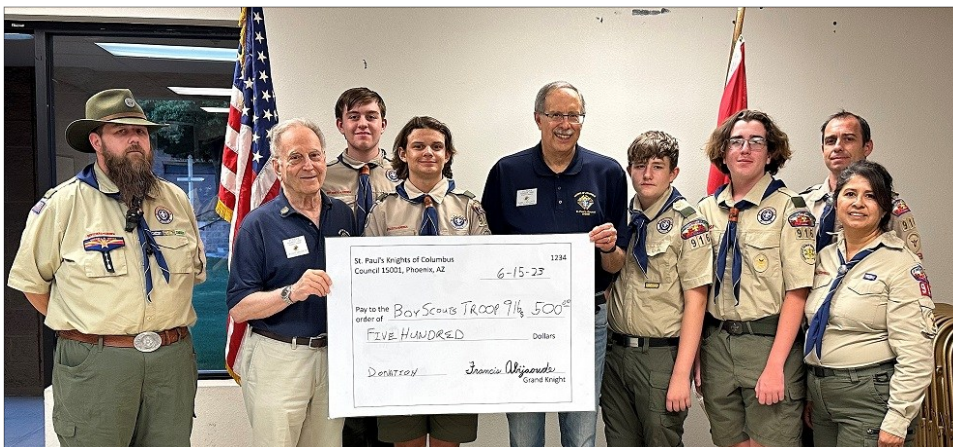

Since our Council's early days, we have partnered with the Sunshine Soccer League in Glendale to become their best sponsor in time, talent, and treasure. The Sunshine League is a non-profit organization that was started in 2001 to provide a place for children with special needs to play soccer and socialize with others. Their players many of whom have been diagnosed with Cerebral Palsy, developmental delays, Autism, Downs Syndrome, visual impairments, ADHD and other disabilities participate in the program. The Sunshine Soccer league does not turn anyone away. They find creative ways to adapt to children who join their program.

Our early fundraising efforts for the Sunshine Soccer league was through the People with Intellectual Disabilities (PID) Drive, also known as the Tootsie Roll Drive. Unfortunately, the PID drive ended several years ago, but our Council's support for the Sunshine Soccer League has grown even stronger.

This year is no different. Our Grand Knight Dan McGinn and Worthy Financial Secretary /Past Grand Knight Kirk LaPlante presented a \$2,000 check to the Sunshine Soccer League organizer, Jill Oliver. The donation was made possible from our 2023 State Raffle proceeds and our Council's gifting committee. This money gives the Sunshine Soccer League the ability to pay for field time at the Arizona Soccer Sports Complex during Sunday afternoons.

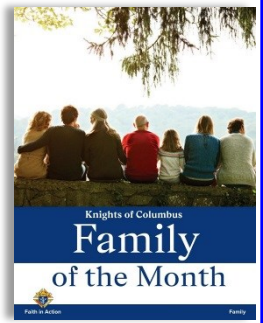

The Knights of Columbus Order has always been interested in the development of strong and vibrant families. To support this philosophy and to create an awareness of many of our parish families, our Knights of Columbus Supreme Council, located in New Haven, Connecticut, started the “Family of the Month” program in 1978. The “Family of the Month” program has become a successful part of our “Faith in Action” program.

What Is The Family of the Month?

The Knights of Columbus “Family of the Month” Program promotes and recognizes families who outwardly exhibit strong ties of love and faith, demonstrating Catholic family values, and how the family makes meaningful contributions to our parish and the community.

Our Council has established a “Family of the Month” committee whose responsibility it will be to select a “Family of the Month”. The committee is made up of our St. Paul’s Knights of Columbus Council members and the St. Paul’s parish staff. We are working together to get recommendations for selecting a “Family of the Month”. Our “Family of the Month” committee is not looking for just “Super Families”, but we are looking for families who live traditional Catholic family values like:

- ◆ Is the family tight knit? Does the family spend quality time together?
- ◆ Does the family attend weekly Mass together? Does the family pray together outside of Mass?
- ◆ Has the family made significant contributions to the parish and church community?
- ◆ Does the family serve as a model of Catholic family values?

On the 15th day of each month — from August through July — the “Family of the Month” submissions will be drawn at random from entries received at our Supreme Council offices in New Haven, Connecticut. Each of the selected families will receive a special Holy Family gift and a personal letter of congratulations from our Supreme Knight, Patrick Kelly. These items will be mailed directly to the family’s home address.

Our “Family of the Month” Committee is also participating in selecting a “Family of the Year”.

The “Family of the Year” selection process is the same as the “Family of the Month”. An eligible “Family of the Year” recipient must be a Knights of Columbus family that has been selected in the last 12 months. Our committee will consider whether the family has continued to show the traits of a strong Catholic family as well as promoting the principles of our Church and of the principles of the Order of the Knights of Columbus.

The Knights of Columbus Supreme Council will make a “Family of the Year” selection received from all Knights of Columbus State Councils. The “Family of the Year” will be invited to attend the annual Knights of Columbus Supreme Convention where a special presentation will be made.

[2023 Arizona Rosary Celebration](#)



The Arizona State Council website has announced that planning for the 2023 Arizona Rosary Celebration is under way. This year's celebration will honor Mary under her title of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. The dates for the celebration are Saturday, October 14 in Tucson and Sunday, October 15, 2023 in Phoenix.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel, or Virgin of Carmel, is the title given to the Blessed Virgin Mary in her role as patroness of the Carmelite Order, particularly within the Catholic Church. The very first Carmelites were Christian hermits living on Mount Carmel in the Holy Land during the late 12th to mid—13th century. They built in their hermitages a chapel which they dedicated to the Blessed Virgin, whom they conceived of in chivalric terms as the "Lady of the Place." Our Lady of Mount Carmel was adopted in the 19th century as the patron saint of Chile. Since the 15th century, popular devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel has centered on the Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, also known as the Brown Scapular. Traditionally, Mary is said to have given the Scapular to an early Carmelite named Simon Stock (1165–1265).

The liturgical feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel is celebrated on July 16th.

Disability income insurance

Benefit Period

The maximum benefit period is the longest period for which monthly disability benefits are payable for any one period of a disability. The benefit resets once the disability concludes. You may choose from:

2-Year – Protect your paycheck with two years of disability income payments.

5-Year – Protect your paycheck with five years of disability income payments.

To Age 67 – Protect all your working years with disability income payments until you reach retirement age.

Monthly Benefit

Working with your Knights of Columbus field agent, you establish the monthly benefit amount that the policy provides, based on your income and subject to certain limits.

Elimination Period

Disability income insurance policies come with an elimination period, which serves as your deductible or out-of-pocket amount. You can select a 30, 90, or 180-day elimination period, after which time your benefits will begin to be paid.

Additional Features and Benefits

A number of special features and benefits – often called riders – are available on Knights of Columbus disability income insurance products. For instance, the catastrophic disability rider provides an additional monthly benefit in the event of a catastrophic disability, and the cost of living adjustment rider helps your monthly benefit keep pace with inflation during a long-term disability.
