Grand Knight's Report

Brothers in Christ,

As we journey through the sacred month of November, we turn our hearts and minds to All Saints and All Souls Days. In the spirit of remembrance, our Council is coordinating a Mass at the Holy Redeemer Cemetery on November 2nd at 8:30 a.m., to honor our departed brothers, wives, friends and relatives, especially those resting at Holy Redeemer and the National Memorial Cemetery.

In our Catholic tradition, we cherish the promise of eternal life offered by Christ. To honor our dead is to acknowledge this profound belief. Our prayers, funeral Masses and special Masses, said for the deceased throughout the year reflect our hope that the souls in Purgatory may attain purification and enter Heaven. This sacred practice is deeply rooted in both tradition and scripture and offers us comfort as we navigate our own grief.

Jesus, in His wisdom, teaches us in the Beatitudes: "Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted." While this divine assurance may seem paradoxical – that from the depths of our sorrow, we can find blessings. Yet, as we mourn and keep the memories of our loved ones alive, we affirm our faith that our prayers may hasten their entrance into Heaven.

Scholars like Nicholas Wolterstorff also remind us, the value of sustained grief is recognized by so many. He poignantly states, "If my child was worth loving when alive, he is worth grieving over when dead." His reflection invites us to embrace our grief, not to let it fade, but to integrate it into our being. Though time may soften our pain, the wound of loss remains, and it is not wrong to honor these feelings.

Jesus calls us to have faith, especially when God feels distant. It is precisely in these moments of death and transition that our faith is crucial, guiding us to believe that we will be reunited with Jesus. Grieving, with God's grace, becomes a path to healing. The void left by our loss can only be filled by God's presence. As the Knights of the Eucharist teach, "Grief cannot heal by her own power. It must have faith, hope and love – faith to look beyond, hope to believe grief has an end, and love to remain close to God."

This openness to love, this willingness to embrace grief, is essential to our faith journey: To open ourselves to love is to open ourselves to grief.

As we weave the fabric of our community at St. Paul's, we invite you to join us for Donut Sunday on November 3rd (rumor has it, there will be Krispy Kreme doughnuts) and BINGO on November 16th at 6:30 p.m. in O'Carroll Hall.

Furthermore, I remind you to mark your calendars for these important events:

Worthy Brothers All,

Today we celebrate the great Catholic explorer **Christopher Columbus**, for whom our Order is aptly named. As the current **Exemplification of Charity, Unity, and Fraternity (CUF)** script notes: *"The first members of our Order chose the name **Columbus** to emphasize that from the earliest days of the European exploration of America, Catholics had played an essential role. Christopher Columbus was a revered hero in the 19th century who inspired the names of cities throughout the United States, including the nation's capital, as well as a province in Canada and a nation in Latin America. Those early Knights recognized Christopher Columbus, not only as an explorer of extraordinary skill and daring, but as a layman committed to bringing the Good News of the Gospel to a New World."*

As a proud Buckeye, I'd add Columbus, Ohio, to the list above...

Digressions aside, the CUF tells our newest brothers what we have celebrated since our founding by **Blessed Father McGivney** in 1882: the European explorers who came to the New World in the 15th century all risked their lives and fortunes with Evangelization in mind. Yes, there were commercial and territorial ambitions involved too, but we imagine Christopher Columbus leading his sailors in night-prayers under the Atlantic skies chanting **Salve Regina** not as an entrepreneur or conqueror, but as a devout follower of Jesus Christ, a Son of Mary and a proud Catholic man. Just as we Knights of Columbus hope to be today.

As much of the western world today experiences heavy seas, with waves of "decolonization", "canceling", and "critical race theory", many would seek to ignore or denigrate the role of Christopher Columbus. Thanks to the wisdom of our Past Supreme Knight Carl Anderson there is a short video resource we can view to remember and better understand Columbus' life and legacy. It is called "**Courage and Conviction: The True Story of Christopher Columbus**" The Oklahoma State Council has made this available free (and easy to use) through YouTube and I hope you'll find a few moments today or this week to (watch it. Brothers, we remember that God has called each of us Knights to Charity, Unity, and Fraternity, and for the many in our Fourth Degree we also dedicate ourselves to Patriotism. Like the great explorer Christopher Columbus we take this Faith and proclaim it to all the nations (generally starting in our own families, neighborhoods and parish).
